President Pridemore said it was her honor to have been sworn into my third elected term, starting her 14th year in this district. She was grateful for the current and past members she had sat with at the table. She was also thankful for the administration, staff and everyone that works in the District.

President Pridemore shared information about the upcoming Michigan Association of School Board CBA classes and certifications. She encouraged members to register and noted that there are also virtual options.

Fall Data – Kim Crenshaw, Executive Director of Curriculum & Technology and Other Administrative team members:

Kim Crenshaw introduced herself and shared her background and connection to Redford Union Schools. She presented on the Fall NWEA Data, noting improvements in ELA but challenges in math, especially at the elementary level. A new reading series was purchased last year, which they started this school year. Their next focus will be the math program, and they will start working on it over the next few months. She spoke on the challenges faced during COVID-19 and the impact on student performance. Enrollment data showed a need to retain students within the district. Other administrators discussed data analysis and interventions at their buildings which included reading interventionists and specialist teachers, PLCs, and tutoring programs. Kim discussed various programs and initiatives being implemented, including the HMH Into Reading series, I Excel, and the Modern Classroom Project. She mentioned the expansion of math 180 and the upcoming implementation of Varsity Tutors for on-demand tutoring. She highlighted the importance of data discussions and the role of PLCs in driving instructional decisions and also emphasized the need for continuous improvement and the importance of student achievement data in guiding district initiatives.

There were questions and answers.

The team will report back to the Board on how many of our school of choice students are underperforming versus our In-District students. Also, how many of those school of choice students that come to us stay with us, absenteeism, and transportation.

Student Leadership Event- Tamaran Dillard, Executive Director of Student Services:

Tamaran Dillard provided updates on the Hope Empowerment Coalition and the development of a student-led Empowerment Coalition. Tamaran sits on the Hope Empowerment Coalition with nine other school districts, along with Jessica Miller, our Coordinator of Social-Emotional Learning and Student Wellness. A cross Wayne County they will educate 65,000 students. She said that number is really important as they talk. As an extension of our Empowerment Coalition, they have decided to develop a student-led Empowerment Coalition, and they are going to look at mental health in our schools, and our secondary campus. Our Board of Education student representative Elisia Juzswik is part of that team.

There was an event held on December 8 at Northville High School that involved students from various schools, including Redford Union, Garden City, Northville, Livonia, and Taylor. There were 31 total students who attended and 17 of those

students were Redford Union students. Matt Schwartz was the presenter, and he is the CEO of Evolving Lives Therapy. He discussed substance abuse, and suicidality, and the data behind that. Breakout sessions allowed students to discuss mental health issues in their schools, highlighting the need for teacher training and consistent boundaries and resources. They talk a lot about teachers not noticing or understanding and presenting issues about mental health and the fact that our teachers do not know how to deal with mental health issues at a high school level. They want training for teachers. They want teachers with consistent boundaries and resources in our schools. The next step for our team is to identify three students. Our District will have a total of 6 students' representatives because of our nineth graders and the high schoolers. The next meeting will be Saturday, March 1st at Plymouth Canton and Tamaran will be there. Our District will host the April meeting. The Board will be updated as this comes about. Tamaran mentioned she wants to have the students come and present to the Board.

Parent Advisory Committee (PAC) Update – Tamaran Dillard, Executive Director of Student Services:

Tamaran Dillard provided updates on the Parent Advisory Committee (PAC) meetings, including a presentation by Stephanie Nichols who is a Training Manager at Michigan Alliance for Families. She presented on Free and Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) and Least Restrictive Environment (LRE). She stated that she has not been able to get in touch with the District's PAC representative due to no response.

There were officer reports. Two of their executive board members had to step down, and RESA decided to transfer the duties back to Wayne, RESA until the fall of 2025 where they can get people on the board who can serve at that time.

The Council for Exceptional Children (CEC) and START training opportunities is an awesome training course through Grand Valley. A special recognition program is April 17.

The MDE will be visiting Wayne County, with a visit to Redford Union scheduled for January 28. They will visit Beech Elementary and Redford Union Junior High School. They will be speaking to staff and interviewing staff members. Tamaran will provide the Board with an update once they get feedback.

An all-inclusive glow party is planned for February 13, with suggestions and feedback from the PAC. The next PAC meeting is scheduled for February 13.

PQ Application Approval by Department of Treasury:

The State of Michigan recently approved, and the District was officially granted their voting date of May 2025.

The Bond process was explained to the Board.

What the district has done with the prior bond issues for this capital program has been they did what is known as a competitive bond sale. They work with Baker Tilly and put together a notice of sale that gets published nationally, and it gets put out there. And there are lots of bond investors out there that want to buy these bonds. The bond underwriter will work with their investors and develop a proposal, and it is given a list of six or seven proposals to buy the bonds at certain interest rates. And that is so we are borrowing money from investors. The reason the District is targeting a May 2025 election is because they have a unique opportunity in May 2025, to do it without an increase in property taxes.
